The Story of the Scallop Shell; Symbol of Pilgrims & Hospitality

I came across The Story of the Scallop Shell; Symbol of Pilgrims & Hospitality, on the Mayflower Society website, <https://themayflowersociety.org>.

The book was written by Diane Finn. Diane is a retired teacher, author and tour guide who lives in Plymouth, Massachusetts. The name of her company is The Tin Lantern Press. Her website is located at <https://thetinlanternpress.com>.

I was intrigued by the significance of the scallop shell and the stories of it as a symbol of hospitality going back to ancient times. This booklet provides a definition, explanation, and examples of the scallop shell's significance and various uses throughout history. These include its relationship to both Native Americans and Pilgrims. Scallop shells are featured in monuments and Burial Hill grave markers in Plymouth, Massachusetts. As we were working on the May 14 meeting, I thought a fun theme would be to use the scallop shell as part of our table decor. The short time I have been involved with our Colony, I have experienced a sense of friendliness and hospitality among the members. I think our respective research journeys to find our ancestors is like a pilgrimage and the help we can give each other reflects the hospitality referenced through the meaning of the scallop shell.
